As part of these activities, the international *Tbilisi Mathematical Journal* (TMJ), founded by the NCST, was taken over by TCMS.

The editors and a rigorous refereeing procedure (requiring two independent positive referee reports and a discussion of the entire editorial board) will ensure the highest international standards.

The print version of the TMJ is published by *College Publications* (CP), and we would like to thank Jane Spurr and Dov Gabbay of CP for their support in setting up this arrangement, and Erik van Aert of Amsterdam University Press (AUP) for easing the move from the originally intended print publisher AUP to CP.
